Placement Considerations

Standard receptacle height is 12-18 inches above the floor, and switches should be placed for easy access, avoiding the hinge side of doors. Ensure the box is flush or slightly inset (about 1/16 inch) from the wall surface to allow the cover plate to sit flat. Verify the box size accommodates all wires, device...
