Tray-rated cables are tested for crush, impact, and environmental exposure, ensuring long-term durability in open tray installations. Fiber optic cables do not have a specific tray rating but must meet NEC Article 770 requirements and any plenum or riser ratings if applicable. Installation Guidelines Support and Securing: Cables must be supported at regular intervals, typically every 6 feet for tray cables, and secured to prevent sagging or movement. Separation: Power and data cables should be separated to minimize electromagnetic interference, following NEC guidelines. Fill Capacity: Tray fill limits must be calculated to avoid overcrowding, which can affect heat dissipation and cable performance. Bend Radius: Maintain the minimum bend radius for network cables as they enter or exit the tray to prevent damage.
