For cables with more than 12 fibers, the sequence repeats with a stripe or marker to distinguish groups (e.g., Blue with black stripe = Fiber 13) or uses additional colors like Olive, Magenta, Tan, and Lime for 16-fiber MPO connectors.

Hybrid or High-Density Cables

Buffer tubes may also be color-coded to indicate sub-units in high-count cables (e.g., 48, 96, 144 fibers). Black jackets with colored stripes are sometimes used for hybrid cables combining multiple fiber types or functions.
